 To Make The High-profile Meeting A Success.





Border Dispute

This Absence Comes Amid A Backdrop Of Heightened Friction Between India & China. The Dispute Over Their Border In The Ladakh Region Escalated Into A Military Standoff 3 Years Ago, Costing The Lives Of 20 Indian And Four Chinese Soldiers. Both Nations Have Fortified Their Positions Along The LAC With Heavy Military Presence, Including Artillery, Tanks, And Fighter Jets.



Standard Map

 Beijing Released A "Standard Map" Laying Territorial Claim Over Arunachal Pradesh, Aksai Chin As Well As Taiwan And The South China Sea. China Releases The Standard Map Every Year But It Is The First Time That India Has Lodged A Strong Protest Over The Map Issues, Rejecting The Claims Of The Communist Nation. The Timing Of The Map Release Was Just A Few Days Ahead Of The G20 Summit.
 At The Recently Concluded BRICS Summit In Johannesburg, PM Modi Held A
 Brief Interaction With Xi Wherein He Had Expressed Grave Concern Over The
 Situation Along The Line Of Actual Control.



Partnership With USA

India's Growing Strategic Partnership With China's Main Geopolitical Rival, The
United States, Has Not Gone Unnoticed By Beijing. Both Countries Expelled Each
Other's Journalists & Trade Tensions Have Increased. India Recently Surpassed
China As The World's Most Populous Nation, Making The Two Asian Giants
Competitors In Technology, Space Exploration, And Global Trade.



The G20 Summit Is A Vital Platform For Economic Cooperation, Comprising Countries That Represent 85% Of The Global GDP And Over 75% Of Global Trade.
