
'Won't Allow Democracy To Be Murdered' CJI Chandrachud On Chandigarh Mayoral Election

Why In The News?

- A Supreme Court Bench Under The Chief Justice Of India On February 4, Heavily Lambasted The Presiding Officer Of The Chandigarh Mayoral Election, Observing That His Conduct Was A "Mockery Of Democracy".
- "Is This The Behaviour Of A Presiding Officer? The Man Defaces The Ballots And Then Looks At The Camera To See Who Is Looking At Him," CJI D.Y.
 Chandrachud Remarked After Seeing The Video Of The Controversial Election In Which The Presiding Officer Was Allegedly Seen Tampering With The Votes.
- "Please Tell Your Presiding Officer That The Supreme Court Is Watching Over Him. We Will Not Allow Democracy To Be Murdered Like This. The Only Thing That Creates Stabilizing Force In The Country Is The Purity Of The Election Process," CJI Further Said.
